A Cabin on the Mountain

In the 1970s, a staff member particularly enjoyed being outdoors and wanted to share his experiences with the residents. With the help of the students, he built a cabin on the mountain at Boys Home by hand using pine logs.

Since then, the cabin has fallen down. Special projects coordinator and teacher Louis Sarratt stumbled upon the cabin remains during a hike. He removed as much material from the original site as was salvageable. Now, Mr. Sarratt is working with students to

build a new cabin. It has a couple sets of bunkbeds for the students to enjoy, and a porch overlooking the beautiful mountain views. Mr. Sarratt also incorporated the surrounding trees into the structure rather than cutting them

down. When complete, students and houseparents will be able to spend time enjoying the great outdoors in the cabin on the mountain.

In coming years, Mr. Sarratt hopes to build several more cabins with his carpentry classes.

Alumni Corner: featuring Bill Barber

Bill Barber arrived at Boys Home in 1945 when he was just six years old. He was living in Dublin, Virginia, when his adoptive father passed away, and his adoptive mother could no longer care for him. A few days after his arrival, staff members realized he was missing and began looking for him. They quickly found him walking down the hill on campus. The six-year-old boy told them he didn't want to be here, and he was leaving. However, that mindset quickly changed. As time passed, he became very fond of Boys Home and says it was the best thing that ever happened to him.

Mr. Barber was at Boys Home until 1958, almost 13 years total. At 19 years old, he enlisted and served in the United States Navy for four years. He said, "Here I was this big 19-year-old guy enlisting in the Navy, and I cried when I had to leave Boys Home! It was the only home I ever knew."

After four years of service, he came back to Boys Home and worked as a staff member for one year before beginning his career at Westvaco, now WestRock. When asked what brought him back to Covington after the Navy, without a pause, he said, "Because this (Boys Home) is my home." Mr. Barber said Boys Home taught him so much about life and he often thinks about the summers on "the Hill," fishing and swimming.

Mr. Barber currently lives in Covington with his wife. It isn't unusual to see him driving through the parking lot, where he will roll his window down and say kindly, "I just wanted to come home."

Hiking, Camping, and Kayaking, Oh My!

This summer, students and staff enjoyed three off-campus backpacking and camping trips. The first trip was an eight-mile hike at North Mountain/Pete's Cave. The boys really liked this trip in particular because of the views, the rock formations (Pete's Cave), and the hike was relatively easy even though it is eight miles.

The second trip was in Greenwood Point Campground at Lake Moomaw. This trip was 6.5 miles total, but the hike into the campground was fairly challenging. Even though the strenuous hike was a bit of an obstacle, the young men loved this one because they got to swim, fish, and cook a steak fajita dinner!

The third adventure was to The New River Junction campground. Students were enthusiastic about this trip, because they didn't have to hike in, the fishing was outstanding, and they had pizza for dinner! Students and staff did have to ride out a few storms in the vehicles, but at last the rain stopped, allowing for fellowship around the campfire.

The staff and students have also had seven kayak trips this summer. Six were on the Jackson River, where everyone had a great time paddling, fishing, swimming, and attempting to flip each other over in the boats.

The seventh trip was on the Cowpasture River. Students put the boats in the river at Boys Home teachers Colonel and Katherine Farmer's home and floated to teacher Anita Proffitt's camp. The boys really liked this boating trip because the water was so much warmer than the Jackson River, so they did quite a bit of swimming. At the end, Mrs. Proffitt had a grilled hot dog lunch ready for the group.
