Dear Friends,

Greetings from "The Hill!" The excitement I initially felt when I became executive director grows with each passing day. The energy is fed by working with amazing young men and a mission-driven staff. As COVID continues to decline in the local area, we have transitioned back to standard operating procedures and protocols. It is great to see smiling faces again and gather as a community for meals, chapel and assemblies.

We continue to be focused on delivering a proven program that provides students with the structure, encouragement and love needed to become successful men. Our residential program develops a strong sense of responsibility, discipline and community. Academically, Boys Home has an independent school that features small class sizes and individualized instruction. The program and the school working in tandem create an ideal environment for students to achieve their full potentials.

There has been an incredible amount of positive activity on campus over the past several months! A highlight in March was Minimester. See page 11 for more details. Let me share some more student activities with you:

- After a winning basketball season, athletics moved into soccer season. The team had success on the field and achieved a winning record. More importantly, players learned the importance of personal accountability and teamwork.
- The student body attended an inspiring workshop led by Build Smart Institute, exposing the students to opportunities
 for meaningful careers in the trades. A few weeks later, a group of students went to Build Smart in Roanoke for two full
 days of carpentry classes and a day applying their skills to a Habitat for Humanity project.
- Current juniors and seniors made college visits to area schools including Radford University, University of Lynchburg and Virginia Tech. They also received counseling on navigating the college application process.
- The highlight of our spiritual life was Holy Week. The week included a Palm Sunday service, the premiere of "The Living Last Supper" play, Maundy Thursday service, Good Friday service, stations of the cross hike and a beautiful sunrise service on Easter Sunday. The sunrise service was followed by breakfast, a massive egg hunt and games. It was a spiritually moving week and a great Easter celebration.
- On May 21, we celebrated the graduation of four seniors. We look forward to following them in their next chapter as they depart with a strong foundation from Boys Home.

This summer the students will be busy participating in summer school, recreational and work programs, attending camps and visiting homes. The staff will be engaged in planning for the 2022-2023 school year and attending professional development training. Key initiatives for next year include enhancing the reading program, character education curriculum, athletics and recreation programs and music offerings. We are looking for another great year of transforming lives!

SENIOR CHALLENGE

It was a Tuesday evening in early May and the night was filled with rain, thunder and a chill was in the air. While most of the Boys Home students were fast asleep in their cottages, four seniors were camping on Lick Mountain. They were embarking on the two-day senior challenge. The tradition, created by alumni, began in 2018. The purpose was to provide the seniors with an adventure-filled bonding experience that would test their strength emotionally, physically and mentally. A series of tasks are executed over two days, each with a specific purpose. A combination of alumni and staff assist with the execution of the challenge. At completion, each participant is left with a sense of accomplishment and memories that will last a lifetime.

Boys Home is situated on 1,200 acres of land. The mountainous landscape provides the perfect backdrop for this physically challenging event. A group picture was captured at the beginning of the challenge, and that photo is placed in a time capsule that is buried on the mountain for the next class to locate. There is a second opportunity for the current class to leave their mark on the mountain. Since the origin of the challenge, a white painted rock lies at the top of Lick Mountain. After choosing their mascot, the participating class paints their mascot on the rock and signs their names. The class of 2022 chose a phoenix. As the seniors climb the mountain during the challenge, they are given a series of Boys Home history questions and a manual containing the answers. The goal is to educate seniors on the rich history of Boys Home before they exit the program at graduation. The next task required survival skills. During the "disabled truck" task, participants change a flat tire, check fluid levels and push the truck uphill. The "bench-build-and-carry" task tested their strength, trade skills and teamwork. After successfully building a bench marked with their graduating year, each team of two carried their bench back to the lodge on Lick Mountain. The benches will be used by future Boys Home students and staff for activities such as the Easter sunrise service.

The senior challenge aids in transitioning seniors from current students to future alumni, and from boys to men. Boys Home alumni often return to assist with the challenge. As the seniors prepare to depart, the alumni motto rings true: "Few have lived as we." Each student who arrives at Boys Home has a unique story. Boys Home provides a proven path to success for students who need a new way forward. It is a place for them to call *home*. The first picture below tells the story and the essence of Boys Home. The emotion felt by everyone present at this moment was tremendous. As the staff and students cheered, four exhausted seniors finished the senior challenge together, hand in hand and bonded as brothers. It is visual proof of the success that occurs every year at Boys Home of Virginia.









ALUMNI CORNER | DONNIE COSTIGAN | A RETURN HOME

As a reader you may ask yourself, "Is the Boys Home of Virginia program actually successful?" Although the organization dates back to 1906, what actually happens to students after they depart from Boys Home? Meet Donnie Costigan. Originally from Colonial Heights, Virginia, nine-year-old Donnie arrived at Boys Home in 1987. Prior to his arrival, problems at home began after his parents divorced and his father remarried. The blending of the two families was unsuccessful. That transition left Donnie and his sister Cindy on the outside of a new family. As time passed, there was no longer a place at "home" for Donnie.

Boys Home provided Donnie with the next chapter in his life, where Donnie would stay through 1995. Upon arrival, he had the clothes he was wearing but brought very few personal items. As a child, Donnie describes himself as a "mischievous rugrat." Eventually, he discovered he had a passion for sports. He played football, basketball and baseball. Donnie excelled in basketball for the Boys Home Indians. He earned the record of second all-time leading scorer with 1,687 points. Donnie states, "Sports kept me out of trouble and taught me the valuable life lesson of winning and losing on and off the court." He also found a family with Executive Director Donnie, Mary, Todd and Darren Wheatley, who welcomed him with open arms. "It was like growing up with brothers," is how Donnie would later describe his relationship with Todd and Darren.

While a student, Donnie was vocal about wanting to be known on campus as an individual, not just an athlete. In 1994 and 1995, he received the George Floyd Rogers Award. That award is given to a young man who by his spirit, example and outstanding citizenship exemplifies the ideals of Boys Home. Additionally, in 1995 he received the Michael Folland Award for showing compassion, leadership and unselfishness. After graduation from Alleghany High School in 1995, Donnie continued his basketball career at Bluefield University, a division II school. Donnie successfully graduated from Bluefield University in 2000 with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

After college graduation, Donnie's path led him to work at Roanoke Valley Juvenile Center for several years. In 2003, he returned to work at Boys Home. While at Boys Home, he has served as a houseparent, intake and evaluation manager, campus life coordinator and team leader. Although he enjoyed those roles, he felt called to give back more to Boys Home. In February 2022, he was promoted to director of athletics and recreation. An initial goal in his new role is to move Boys Home into an independent sports league and expand the variety of sports offered on campus. There will also be a focus on providing an opportunity for every student interested in sports to be able to play in some fashion. He is ideal for the role as an alumnus with a true passion for sports. Donnie is married to Robin Costigan, and together, they share three grandchildren. Donnie has a son, Hampton, and two stepchildren, Tayler and JJ. In an interview during his senior year of high school, he stated, "Boys Home provided me with an education, encouragement and showed me the true meaning of home."

Is the Boys Home program a success? Donnie Costigan is an individual who exemplifies that a successful man has to start somewhere, and for Donnie and many others, that place is Boys Home of Virginia.

Several students enjoyed field trips to Luray Caverns and The National Gallery of Art.




